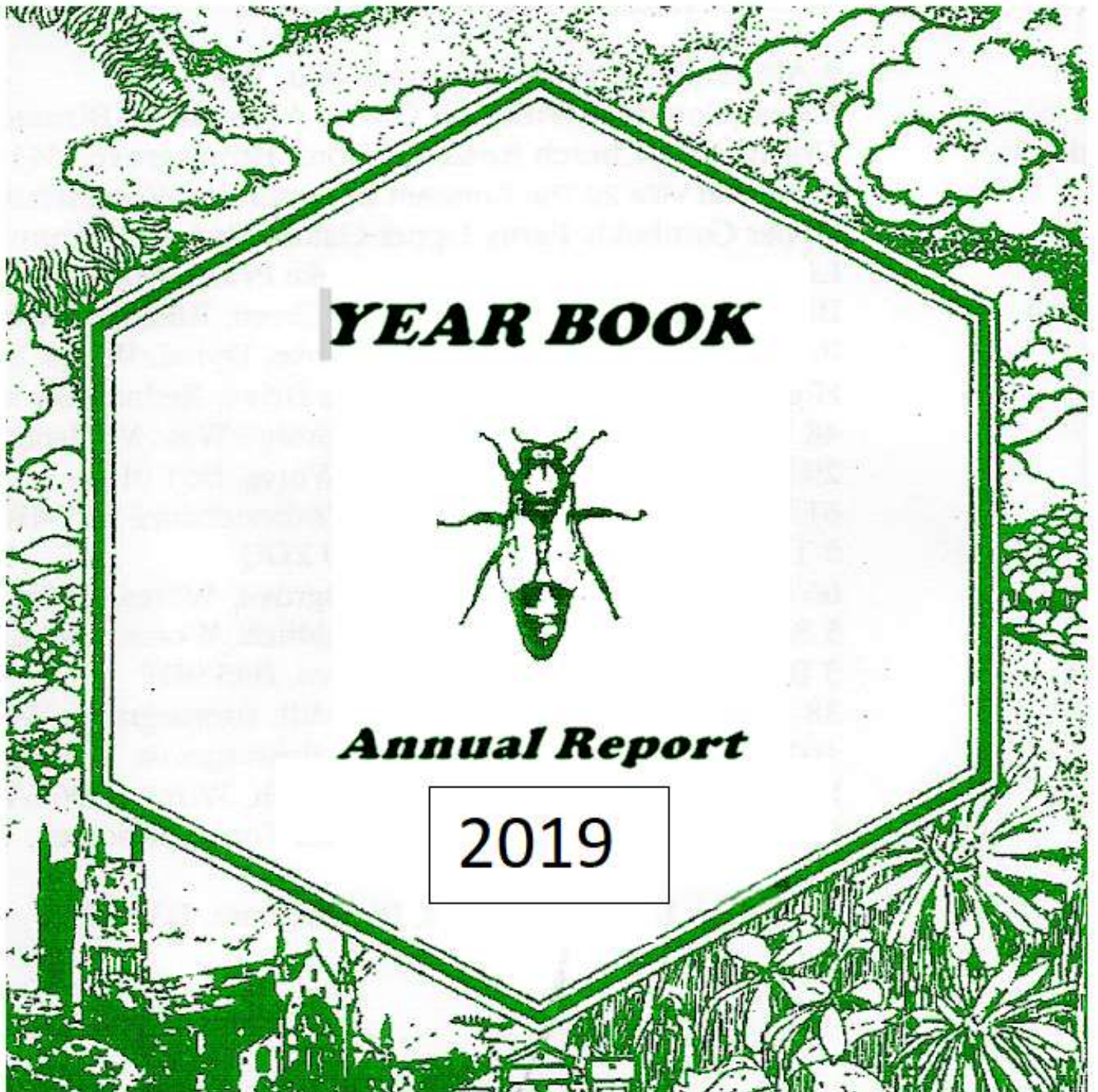

**MINUTES OF THE 136th ANNUAL GENERAL MEETING of
THE WORCESTERSHIRE BEEKEEPERS' ASSOCIATION**

**HELD ON Saturday 7 April 2018
At Chaddesley Corbett Village Hall**

Welcome and Introduction

Sue Limbrey, the Chairman of Kidderminster branch welcomed 50 members to the meeting and explained the format for the afternoon. She introduced our guest speaker before handing over to Martyn Cracknell to chair the AGM.

1 - Apologies

2- Minutes of the previous meeting and matters arising

The minutes of the 135th AGM as printed in the yearbook were approved as a true record of the meeting. Matters arising from the previous minutes (numbers refer to the previous minutes):

2i. Communication with members. A quarterly report was mooted, to inform members about discussions and decisions taken by the executive committee. Circulation costs of a paper version would be prohibitive, but draft minutes of the County AGM, a version of the yearbook and a summary of the December Executive meeting were posted on the County website in 2018.

When the new BBKA and BDI registration scheme is fully implemented it should be possible to communicate directly to members by e-mail with statutory notices, like the notice of the AGM.

ii. Some branch reports were missing from last year's yearbook. Two of them are attached here for completeness of the historical record. This year, a longer lead in time was given to secretaries. (and I checked my spam folder!! Ed.)

3 - Consideration of Annual Reports

All annual reports are in the yearbook. The following notes are supplementary to the yearbook.

President's Report - The President reported on the recent children's event held at Malvern showground called Countrytastic. Our display has grown year on year with observation hives, honey tasting, skep sniffing, candle rolling, lucky dipping, rubber stamping, screen printing and honey bottling. We were first encouraged to participate by John Gowar and it has become a fixture in our calendar, and we are always willing to include new ideas and volunteers.

Treasurer's Report - We received the sad news that John Hill, our examiner of accounts had died in February, shortly after reviewing our accounts. Condolences were sent to his wife on behalf of WBKA, and he will be sadly missed.

As our finances are healthy it has been decided to spend some money on a pop-up banner and flags for use at shows. No increase in membership fees are proposed.

A new membership system is being introduced by BDI and will be rolled out to BBKA membership. This will probably cause some difficulties in the short term but should be simpler thereafter.

National Honey Show Report - Rebecca Day had been missed off the list of those who had achieved success at the show She achieved a Highly Commended for her Class86 Instructive exhibit. Ken Beddoe also achieved a Highly commended for Class 36Two Square sections, and 2nd prize for Class153 dark Honey.

4 - Constitutional changes.

In section 3.b.ii, to replace the term 'Auditor' with 'Independent examiner' and 'audited' with 'examined', in accordance with section 145 of the Charities Act

Proposed Malcolm MacGarrow, seconded Martyn Cracknell, Agreed unanimously.

5 - Election of Officers

They were proposed en-bloc by Tim Vivian and seconded by Neil Morris. The proposal was passed nem. con.

6- Election of County Honorary Members

David Mills proposed that Martyn Cracknell should be made an Honorary member. He has been County President for ten years and has made a major contribution to beekeeping in Worcestershire. Seconded by Sue Limbrey and passed unanimously.

7- Any Other Business

A healthy bee's day is under discussion for 2019 and NBU inspectors have been approached. All other aspects are still to be decided. On a show of hands, the members voted in favour a Worcestershire beekeeping weekend in conjunction with a Healthy Bees day. This will be taken back to the Executive committee. Nick Templar gave a review of the County website and encouraged members to use it and to communicate any issues to him. Between 200 - 300 prospective beekeepers showed interest via the website and their details have been fed through to appropriate branches.

8- Presentation of County Honey Show Cups

All honey show cups were presented as detailed in the yearbook.

The meeting closed at 15.40 and members were able to mingle over a buffet tea.

We then enjoyed an excellent talk on 'The Importance of Drones' from Lynne Ingram

Constitution of Worcestershire Beekeepers Association (2005 -as amended 2018)

1.
 - a The name shall be "Worcestershire Beekeepers Association", hereafter termed the Association.
 - b The aim shall be to support and promote the welfare and keeping of honeybees and the interests of beekeepers.
2.
 - a The Association shall comprise Branch Associations in the geographical area of Worcestershire (2004) together with their members as follows:
 - (i) Ordinary members - subscription for the following year to be set at the Annual General Meeting;

- (ii) Junior members - under 18 years of age at 31 December of that year, to be half the Ordinary rate;
 - (iii) Honorary Life members - elected at a General Meeting.
 - b Subscriptions shall be due on 1 January each year and Branches shall be responsible for collection from their own members. Each year Branches shall forward to the County Treasurer by 14 March monies they have received in accordance with 2a (i) and 2a (ii) above including Branch Life Members by that time. Such monies received after that time must be forwarded by 31 August.
 - c Each Branch shall be responsible for its own financial management.
- 3.
- a Annual General Meetings shall be held, usually during April, at intervals not exceeding 13 calendar months with at least one during each calendar year. The Chairman for the Meeting shall be the President, retiring Chairman or Vice-Chairman of the Executive Committee, or a person elected by the Meeting.
 - b Each Annual General Meeting shall include the following:
 - (i) Elections for the following Officers: President, Secretary, and Treasurer. Vice Presidents may also be elected. One person may hold the dual office of Secretary/Treasurer. Written consented nominations, signed by both proposer and seconder, must be received by the Secretary not less than 7 days earlier.
 - (ii) If re-elected at consecutive General Meetings the Secretary and the Treasurer may normally hold office for up to 4 years.
 - (iii) Presentation of examined accounts for the previous year ending 31st December and appointment of an Independent Examiner of accounts for the next year.
 - (iv) Arrangement of the date of the next Annual General Meeting.
 - (v) Any changes to the Constitution which has been previously proposed in the correct way, (See 6. below).
 - c Each member as in 2a. Present shall be entitled to vote and the Chairman shall have a casting vote.
- 4.
- a The management of the Association shall be by an Executive Committee composed of:
 - (i) The Officers as in 3b.(i) above;
 - (ii) Two named representatives or named reserve representatives chosen by each Branch;
 - b The Executive Committee shall meet at least 4 times each year. It shall elect its Chairman and Vice Chairman for the year. It shall receive a financial statement from the Treasurer at each meeting. The Executive Committee may:
 - (i) Fill any vacancy which occurs in any Office during that year.
 - (ii) Appoint any sub-committee to act during that year.
 - (iii) Authorise and assist the formation of new Branches or the winding-up or amalgamation of any existing Branches.
 - (iv) Arrange meetings and or shows.
 - (v) Co-opt any member of the Association or appoint Special Officers for that year.
 - (vi) Refuse membership to any person without giving reason.
 - (vii) Incur financial liability up to a limit of £500 having due regard to the sound financial management of the Association.
 - c The quorum for the Executive Committee shall be 5 and the Chairman shall have a casting vote.

5.
 - a The Secretary of the Association shall send notice and agenda of an A.G.M. or Special General Meeting including details of any proposed changes to the Constitution to each County member not less than 14 days before the meeting and notice and agenda of each meeting of the Executive Committee to committee members not less than 7 days before the meeting.
 - b The Secretary must arrange a Special General Meeting within 28 days of receipt of a written request for such a meeting signed by 10 members or made by the Executive Committee and a Special Meeting of the Executive Committee within 14 days of receiving a written request by 6 committee members.
6. Any proposed changes to the Constitution shall be made at a General Meeting, shall require 28 days written notice to the Secretary to be given by 2 members and a majority of 2 to 1 of members present.

President's Report

As I write this, the sun is shining strongly and the pussy willow catkins are full of pollen, but there is a chilling wind and the forecast is for it to become much colder. No bees are flying today, but three weeks ago it was unseasonably warm and queens might well have been stimulated into early brood rearing. This may prove to be a repeat of last year when mild spells were interspersed with bitterly cold blasts which the media dubbed as 'the beast from the east' I had terrible colony losses at home and surviving stocks were pathetic. I did not have a single colony suitable to show beginners what a normal colony should be like. Fortunately, in my sheltered apiary in Worcester, the bees wintered well and I was able to bring bees in, and concentrate on producing bees rather than Spring honey.

Colonies across the county must have been very slow to build up because we had very few calls to collect swarms and many people were left waiting for bees, well into the season. The BBKA and our County swarm collection system has worked well for the last few years, but when swarms were scarce this year, people travelled from out-County to pick up swarms that they had heard about on social media.

There have been quite a few changes to branch officers over the year and I would like to thank those who are standing down for their contribution and welcome their replacements. Members are often deeply involved in their branch activities whilst being unaware of activities in neighbouring branches or the centrally organised events. It is through your membership of the County association that you become members of the BBKA, and because we are a registered charity, we are able to reclaim covenanted tax on behalf of branches which is a significant income stream for them. Members of all branches contribute to the County events such as the AGM and County Honey show, and the displays at Countrytastic, Malvern Spring garden Festival and the Royal Three Counties Show and we are always keen to welcome new volunteers. These all require an army of 'behind the scenes' helpers as does our representation on outside bodies, our local examiner, membership secretary, webmaster, treasurer, secretary and executive members.

Later this year, we will be holding a Worcestershire Conference at Pershore College incorporating a Healthy Bees day with National Bee unit inspectors. We have engaged top flight speakers, a wide range of practical activities and some fun entertainment so make a date 31 August to 1 September

WBKA Secretary Report

At the start of the year Malvern Branch suggested that their Honey show staging needed replacing as it had become rickety, and asked if the County might contribute since it is used to stage the County Honey show at Malvern each year. The executive agreed to pay £300 towards the new system which was later used at the County Honey show and was a significant improvement. The display at the Spring Garden Festival at the Malvern showground is put on by each branch in rotation and this also incurs expense which may be a burden on branches. Accordingly, the executive decided that it would provide £200 towards show expenses, like laminated photos or screens, but it would be expected that any items with a repeat show value might be available to other branches for other shows. Worcester branch borrowed artefacts from the Beekeeping History Group in their exhibit of beekeeping throughout history which attracted many favourable comments.

Two advertising feather flags with the words 'Bees and Honey' on a background of honeycomb were produced and a self-supporting pull up poster giving general information about WBKA with beekeeping pictures. These are suitable for local shows and are available from The President, but they will be required for the Malvern Spring, the three Counties and the County Honey show.

Evesham branch have decided to stock 12oz. jars for their members as well as traditional 1lb.squats. This led to them requesting whether these jars would be acceptable at the County Honey show. After consulting the Show judge, it was ruled to be acceptable ONLY in the gift classes, novice class and

the Commercial class of six matching jars. This is in line with the policy guidelines of the National Honey show.

Executive meetings are held four times a year at the Community room, Waitrose store, London Road, Worcester. Anyone is welcome to attend. Forthcoming dates are June 7th September 6th, December 6th from 7 - 9pm. (all are Fridays)

COUNTY HONEY SHOW REPORT 2018

The Annual Worcestershire Beekeeping Association Honey Show took place at the Malvern Autumn Show over the weekend of 29th & 30th September, 2018. It was held in the Friesian pavilion with Worcester University and the Bumblebee Conservation trust, and a 'teas and cake' fundraiser for a special needs group.

As mentioned in the County secretary's report, the new staging was used and it proved to be a very successful design. Our location was advertised by the new Feather banners which may have contributed to the improved honey sales compared to the previous year. (2017= £1500, 2018=£2014), but the footfall still seemed less than we have enjoyed in the large halls.

We are permitted to sell honey by the show ground, and have previously sold wax blocks but this year there was a huge array of items for sale including miscellaneous sizes of comb honey at different prices, different sizes of honey jar, heather honey, candles, booklets and cosmetics. This makes checking stock in and out, too complicated and there will have to be restrictions on what is permitted in future and more uniformity in price per item.

Report of the National Honey Show

The National Honey Show is held in October over a three-day period (Thursday - Saturday) and is the most comprehensive and prestigious honey show in the world. In 2018 there were 2022 entries from 261 exhibitors. As well as the honey show, the event attracts top international speakers who are experts in their field. There are a series of lectures for beginners, a series of lectures that will appeal to the majority of beekeepers and then a series of lectures on the latest honeybee research. If you want to gain new skills then there is a good choice of workshops. Free time between all the lectures and workshops can be spent in the excellent trade show which has a wide range of beekeeping suppliers. There are also evening social events, if you have the stamina.

You must, however, leave time to visit the honey show. The honey show is very impressive with a large number of classes. A small number of Worcestershire members enter the classes at the National on a regular basis but I would like to encourage more members to enter. It can seem a bit daunting at first but those who have won classes at the County Show have gone on to do very well at the National. The judging is done to the same standard. Rhona had a further accolade as she was selected by the Worshipful Company of Wax Chandlers to receive their Annual Prize. This entailed being the Guest of Honour at a formal dinner held at this City Livery company's Hall in London, alongside the Lord Mayor of London.

Midlands & South Western Counties Convention

There was no MSWCC conference in 2018 and the number of contributing counties has diminished to five. (Derbyshire, Gloucestershire, Herefordshire, Swansea and District, and Worcestershire) Derbyshire has its own spring conference, and none of the others was prepared to organise one last year. In order to maintain a degree of continuity the MSWCC decided to sponsor a speaker at the Welsh Beekeepers 75th Anniversary conference held in Aberystwyth. There are no proposals to organise a 2019 MSWCC conference either. However, the MSWCC did indicate that they would sponsor a speaker at the Worcestershire Conference if it was organised. It is anticipated that Gloucestershire will organise a conference in 2020, which would be the 90th anniversary of the founding of this conference.

A Worcestershire Conference, incorporating an NBU Healthy Bees Day 'Better Bees, Better Husbandry, and Better Bee Health'

The members attending last year's AGM, were asked whether they would support a Worcestershire beekeeping weekend in 2019, and they indicated that they would enthusiastically back it. A sub-committee of the executive have therefore been exploring themes and speakers, demonstrations and workshops and have circulated a draft programme to all members. We have confirmed the national speakers, dates and venue and whilst some details remain, we are now in a position to invite applications. You will find a hard copy, and application form with this yearbook. We intend to post a full version with the programme on the county website soon.

Branch Schedule

Each year, the executive member of one branch, takes the chair for the next four executive meetings.

In the same year, that branch hosts the County AGM. They arrange the venue and date, and organise a tea for the those who attend, for which they charge a nominal amount to cover their expenses.

They arrange for a speaker to give a talk after the business of the meeting. The County contributes to the cost of the speaker from central funds. The county pays for the hire of the venue.

Two years later, that branch is responsible for a display at the Spring garden show at Malvern. We have an information area usually with an observation hive and a sales area for honey and hive products. We have this stand space free of charge, but in return we are required to put on an educational, entertaining or interesting exhibit for the enjoyment of the public. The stand is indoors, or in a dedicated marquee with security guards. A £200 budget is available from central funds to help defray show expenses. Reusable props to be available for other shows on request.

The Malvern Show runs over four days so there will be a need for stewards to man the stand, talk to the public about bees, and sell the honey. It is a good day out and you get a free ticket for a couple of hours on duty on the stand.

The GWBKA supports and encourages beekeeping in the area covering Eardiston to Ombersley, Clows Top to Hallow and the surrounding villages. Our year-round monthly informal meetings on the first Thursday of every month stimulate discussions on all topics bee-related and are attended by members of all levels of experience to provide tips and advice on looking after our bees. In 2018 we organised several activities including a Bee Safari and the GWBKA honey show as well as an introduction to beekeeping course.

Our successful Bee Safari in early June was led by the engaging and knowledgeable duo of Richard and Rhona Toft from Pershore and took us to three of our members apiaries in Clows Top, between Holt Heath and Shrawley and in Little Witley. It covered topics such as how to encourage a modest-sized healthy colony to increase in size to eventually make a new colony; How to take a nuc from a colony bursting with bees and containing several charged queen cells. In early September, we held the GWBKA honey show at one of our member's farm, where our members competed in many different categories from light and dark liquid honey and creamed honey through to educational exhibits, photography and honey cake, bread and biscuits, split across three classes to reflect experience (experienced, novice and junior).

The GWBKA also offers a selection of resources that are available to its members such as vaporisers to treat hives with oxalic acid through to honey extractors which certainly came in handy with the bumper honey harvest experienced by many in 2018.

In 2019, we will be running our introduction to beekeeping course which was attended by three new members in 2018 who all happily set off into the world of beekeeping with shiny new packages of bees to set up new colonies at the end of the course. “During the beginning of the year we met in Stourbridge with talks on The Asian Hornet and Swarming. We again ran a beginner’s course in beekeeping which was fully booked.

The practical season usually starts after The Beekeepers Annual Dinner in Kidderminster and the Apiary Clean-up but by May only one meeting had gone ahead due to the endless cold wind from the east. Finally, we were able to resume practical sessions at the branch apiary and Virginia Webb held a Bee Tea at her home. We kept members up-to-date by email, texts and Facebook.

Extracting the branch honey on 22 May went smoothly. There was no Oil Seed Rape growing near Iverley this year, so for the first time in memory, we extracted 106lb of a very different and delightful honey.

The summer crop was taken off at the beginning of August after postponements due to rain, we eventually extracted the summer honey on 9 August. We took 63 pounds from Iverley and nothing from our site at Wolverley.

The branch honey extractor was loaned out nine times in 2017 and we arranged for the complete replacement of all our Commercial hives with Deep Nationals from David Pearce from Taunton. We have good stocks of honey jars, Apiguard and Nitrile gloves on sale to members.

We have had exceptional interest in the 2018 Training Course.”

Branch report for 2019

Hagley & Stourbridge Beekeepers held its usual pattern of Winter and Summer meetings with Winter talks on Wednesdays on subjects like The Bumblebee

Conservation Trust, The Nature of Wyre Forest, our Apiary Hive Changes and The Asian Hornet, all at New Road Methodist Church.

We held an eight-part beginners training course in February attended by twelve candidates followed by ten practical sessions.

Work continued throughout the New Year on our nine colonies of bees, they were treated for Varroa with the Trickle Oxalic Acid method. All the full-sized hives were wrapped with insulation and some were fed candy where needed.

We clipped and marked our Queens in 2018 and transferred most colonies to new Deep National Brood. The Spring honey crop was exceptional considering that the bees had so much foundation to draw out.

We ordered ten new made-up hives complete with flat frames, from David Pearce who lives in Bathealton near Taunton as well as purchasing various other equipment such as 11 packs of National deep brood foundation, bee suits, 20 boxes of extra-large blue nitrile gloves and two new hive stands.

The branch Honey extractor has been hired out four times and the Solar Wax Extractor has been used extensively during June and July.

We are trying to reduce the equipment we own by selling unused items on wbka.net.

Generally, Apiary Meetings were well attended, the honey extracting for beekeepers with only a few supers was successful with five beekeepers coming to take part, thus saving the mess at their homes.

Despite us changing over to Deep National hives this year we extracted 30lb of Oil Seed Rape Honey in late May, followed by ninety-three pounds of Summer honey at Iverley, ninety pounds at Wolverley and sixty-two pounds from our bees at Kinver. Our Iverley honey crop may have been bigger but one of the hive stands collapsed and threw everything down the bank, and one of the hives at Wolverley refused to move into its new Deep National or collect any honey so the Wolverley honey came from just one hive. The hive at Kinver had five supers on, but regrettably the bottom two supers were rape honey and had set. So, our total summer crop was two hundred and forty-five pounds.

The Bee Tea at Virginia Webb's house was very well supported indeed despite it clashing with the England World Cup football match.

A great year beekeeping!
